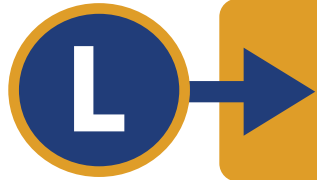
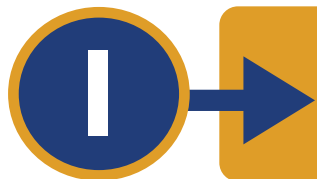


The L.I.S.T.E.N. Method

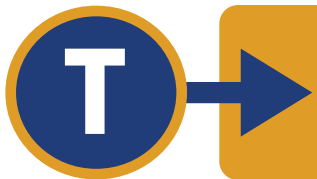
LEARN about the case and the relevant parties.

INTRODUCTION TO ADULT PROTECTIVE SERVICES (APS) IN MASSACHUSETTS

An *Introduction to APS in Massachusetts* video marks the first in an educational video series that aims to shed light on the prevalence of abuse against individuals with disabilities and older adults while equipping APS and other allied professionals with the knowledge and tools to effectively recognize, report and respond to abuse. Within Massachusetts, the Department of Children and Families (DCF), Department of Public Health (DPH), Disabled Persons Protection Commission (DPPC) and Executive Office of Aging and Independence (AGE) collectively provide protective services and address instances of abuse, neglect and exploitation affecting children, adults with disabilities and older adults. This video specifically highlights the roles of DPPC and AGE as well as discusses the Building Partnerships for the Protection of Persons with Disabilities and Older Adults Initiative (BPI).

All three videos in this series are built on the principles of the L.I.S.T.E.N. method and detail how to conduct a successful interview with adults with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD), adults with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and adults with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias. Through expert testimonials, survivor feedback and mock interviews that model real cases, each training video informs and educates viewers on the necessity for effective, trauma-informed interviews, and guides viewers through proper interviewing techniques to elicit the most reliable information. The L.I.S.T.E.N. video series also highlights the importance of using a Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) approach when interviewing adults with disabilities and older adults. Most significant, the L.I.S.T.E.N. method includes the premise that each survivor is an individual with their own abilities. As such, investigators need to be flexible to accommodate the individual needs of a survivor.
